The Council is comprised of current sorority members who have disaffiliated from their chapters during recruitment in order to provide unbiased planning and support for all involved in the process. The Panhellenic Council strengthens the Fraternity & Sorority Community and is responsible for promoting scholarship, philanthropy, and safety for each sorority as well as the Fraternity & Sorority Community as a whole.

The Michigan State Panhellenic Association desires to build a community that reflects diversity and inclusion within our sorority chapters. We strive to make our campus stronger through our commitment to promoting diversity and creating positive change within the Greek community. Women of all backgrounds make up the Michigan State University Panhellenic Council and each individual is celebrated for her perspectives, ideas and contributions to her organization and to our entire community.

Creed of the National Panhellenic Conference

We, as Undergraduate Members of women's fraternities, stand for good scholarship, for guarding of good health, for maintenance of fine standards, and for serving, to the best of our ability, our college community. Cooperation for furthering fraternity life, in harmony with its bets possibilities, is the ideal that shall guide our fraternity activities.

We, as Fraternity Women, stand for service through the development of character, inspired by the close contact and deep friendship of individual fraternity and Panhellenic life. The opportunity for wide and wise human service, through mutual respect and helpfulness, is the tenet by which we strive to live.

Potential New Member BILL OF RIGHTS

Potential New Members have:

- The right to be treated as an individual.
- The right to be fully informed about the recruitment process
- The right to ask questions and receive true and objective answers from Recruitment Guides and members
- The right to be treated with respect
- The right to be treated as a capable and mature person without being patronized
- The right to ask how and why, and to receive straight answers
- The right to have and express opinions to Recruitment Guide
- The right to have inviolable confidentiality when sharing information with Recruitment Guide
- The right to make informed choices without undue pressure from others
- The right to be fully informed about the binding agreements implicit in the membership acceptance signing
- The right to make one's own choice and decision and accept full responsibility for the results of that decision
- The right to have a positive, safe and enriching recruitment and new member experience

Potential New Member EXPECTATIONS

By signing up for Fall 2019 Formal Recruitment you have agreed to the following guidelines:

- To be eligible for Membership Recruitment, Potential New Members must be accepted and enrolled as a full-time student (minimum 12 units) at Michigan State University.
- PNMs must attend all academic classes and labs during the recruitment period for the duration of the class scheduled time.
- Potential New Members must attend all of the events to which they are invited for the entire Formal Recruitment Week.
- No woman shall be allowed to join a National Panhellenic Conference organization during formal Fall Formal Recruitment, unless she has attended all events in each set to which she has invitations.
- Any Potential New Member who does not attend an event without a pre-approved excuse (ex: illness or other emergency) by the Panhellenic Council will be asked to leave the formal recruitment process.
- Potential New Members must attend the Formal Recruitment events at the time the computer has scheduled them to attend. This is to prevent confusion and mix-ups.
- Potential New Members may not contact any active sorority members during Formal Recruitment Week. Sorority members may not contact Potential New Members outside of scheduled Formal Recruitment events.
- Sorority members may not make promissory

- comments, or give oral or written invitations to join to any Potential New Members. Bids are to be issued only on the scheduled Bid Day. Contact a Panhellenic officer or Recruitment Guide if a situation like this occurs at any time.
- Potential New Members must be respectful to all sorority women and not spread rumors or make disparaging remarks about chapters, chapter members, or other Potential New Members. Violation of this rule will result in immediate removal from the Formal Recruitment process.
- After a few attempts at a conversation an active member may say "I noticed you aren't actively engaging with me or responding".
- Potential New Members may not be on their phones or have them out while they are in a Chapter Facility. Violation of this rule will result in immediate removal from the Formal Recruitment process.
- Formal Recruitment is a substance free process. Women may not use or be in the presence of drugs or alcohol during the Formal Recruitment Process. Violation of this rule will result in immediate removal from the Formal Recruitment process.
- If a Potential New Member wishes to withdraw from Formal Recruitment, they must complete the withdrawal form, found at the PNM Resource Center.

- Nothing from the Chapter Facilities may be taken as a "souvenir". Violation of this rule may result in immediate removal from the Formal Recruitment process.
- It is recommended that Potential New Members be fully aware of the financial obligations of membership before accepting a bid. It is to their advantage to ask questions during Formal Recruitment events if they have questions about finances.
- Following Preference Round, if Potential New Members wish to be eligible to join a sorority, they must complete and sign a Membership Recruitment Acceptance Binding Agreement, or MRABA. It is not guaranteed that every woman who goes through Formal Recruitment will receive a bid to join a sorority.
- Potential New Members are urged to keep an open mind during Formal Recruitment to ensure any decisions they make are their own.
- I agree to have pictures taken of me by Panhellenic Council for promotional purposes.
- Should I choose to violate any of the above agreements, I am subject to removal from the Formal Recruitment process.
- If a new member decides to remove herself from her sorority after she is initiated, she will be unable to join another sorority within the NPHC, MGC, or Panellenic councils.

First Year TIPS AND SUGGESTIONS

Tip #1: Take notes! The point of this booklet is to help you take notes and reflect after your time spent with each chapter. After Spirit Day, many of the 14 chapters may "mesh together" in your memory which is why it is important to take detailed notes after each party; you'll thank yourself later!

Tip #2: Don't stress about your outfit. While every woman wants to present herself in a positive way, remember that recruitment is not about the clothes. Members in each chapter want to get know your individual personality and values. To reflect these things, wear whatever you feel most comfortable in. But if you find yourself really torn, reach out to your Recruitment Guide and ask her for help!

Tip #3: Remember this process is about YOU! If your roommate or best friend from high school end up with different chapters than you do, don't stress; this process is unique to every woman going through it! You can be best friends with women in and outside of your chapter, but no matter what stay true to yourself.

Tip #4: Time management is key! While recruitment can be an exciting and intense time, women who manage their time will find the process much easier than those who do not! Remember to allow enough time for your meals, homework, and sleep during recruitment - take advantage of the breaks during the weekdays. Being early to all events/parties is key to a successful recruitment.

Tip #5: Keep an open mind. When you receive your schedule from your Recruitment Guides at the beginning of each round, you may receive a schedule different from what you ranked during selections. Don't get discouraged. Trust the process and keep going.



Frequently ASKED QUESTIONS

I am a legacy, does that mean I am guaranteed to get into that

sorority? No. Each sorority has their own policies regarding legacies. While it can be exciting to have a connection or tie to a chapter, the most important part is to keep an open mind through the recruitment process and find the best fit for YOU.

Each chapter selects their own membership and being a legacy does not mean you will get a bid to join.

Please see individual chapter pages in this booklet for who each chapter considers legacies. For questions or concerns regarding legacy policies please contact the chapter's national advisor listed on the chapter page.

Are letters of recommendation mandatory for women to go through the recruitment

process? Letters of recommendation are NOT mandatory for the recruitment process. They will also not impact your chances of receiving a bid.

What are the expectations for a woman going through Panhellenic Recruitment? The most

mellenic Recruitment? The most important expectation is to have a good attitude. The recruitment process can be a long and stressful one, but it is important to keep positive and trust the Recruitment Guides and Panhellenic Recruitment Team.

The other important expectation is that you attend ALL recruitment events, including orientation and all events on your schedule each day.

What if I have class and I need to miss a recruitment event?

If you have class or another important obligation it is understandable to miss a recruitment event. If you have class, notify your Recruitment Guide and she will help you to register your excuse on the recruitment website.

If you register your excuse, chapters will be able to see that and may still invite you to the next round. However, missing an event can greatly impact your recruitment experience and we recommend changing the conflict, unless it is class, to avoid missing any events. Remember if you do not have an excused absence and you miss an event it may result in you being removed from recruitment

How do sororities decide who to invite back to their events?

Recruitment is a mutual selection process. This means PNMs rank the sororities they would most like to return to, and the chapters provide a list of PNMs they would like to invite back. Those two lists are matched, and that is how schedules for the following day are created. It is important to know that every sorority has a different, private process they go through in completing their lists.

How do I decide which sorority

to join? The Panhellenic recruitment structure is created so you are able to meet women from every chapter and get a glimpse of how you may fit into their chapter. While ultimately the decision is only one you can make for yourself, there are many resources to help make the process and decisions a bit easier.

Recruitment Guides are counselors who support you through the decision-making process and are trained to help both with the college transition and recruitment process. If you are torn about what chapter to join, reach out to your Recruitment Guide or anyone on the Panhellenic Council and have them process with you.

Someone told me I'm guaranteed a bid, should I believe

her? No. One individual member cannot guarantee a woman will be able to join any organization. Sorority members are not allowed to promise membership to any potential new member. If a member tells you that you are "guaranteed" to be in her organization, let your Recruitment Guide or another authority figure know ASAP, in private, and she will handle it accordingly.

If I decide to withdraw from Fall recruitment can I go through recruitment in the spring? Michigan State does not offer a formal spring recruitment process. Not every chapter will participate in spring recruitment.

What if I do not want to accept a bid from a chapter? After the Preference Round of recruitment, Potential New Members will sign a Membership Recruitment Acceptance Binding Agreement (MRABA). This is a binding contract that says that the Potential New Member agrees to accept a bid for membership from the chapter(s) she has listed on the agreement. If a PNM decides to not accept the bid, she must wait one full calendar year to go through the formal recruitment process again.

What is the time commitment involved being in a sorority? As a new member in a sorority you should expect a few meetings a week. Being a member of a sorority is a big time commitment. Meetings range from chapter, sisterhood events, philanthropy events and more. In the end, the experience is what you make of it. While few events are actually mandatory, women who participate in a wide range of chapter events will get more of being in a chapter.

Signing MRABA

At the completion of the primary recruitment period, all women are given the option to sign a Membership Recruitment Acceptance Binding Agreement (MRABA). In order to receive a bid from a sorority on campus, the MRABA must be signed. The purpose of the MRABA is to ensure your awareness of the commitment you are making when you submit your final selections. Please carefully consider the following points as you complete your MRABA

Your options when considering your agreement are:

- You may choose not to complete an agreement at this time.
- You may choose to list any women's fraternity/sorority whose preference (last) event you attended and from which you are willing to accept an invitation to membership (a bid).
- You may choose to limit your choices to just one or list any women's fraternity/ sorority whose preference round (last) event you attended and are willing to accept membership. Please note that by not listing the maximum number of events you attended you may be limiting your potential to join any other NPC group during this recruitment should you not be placed with your choice(s). Being a member of a sorority is a big time commitment.
- When you sign this binding agreement, you are agreeing to accept an invitation to membership from any NPC fraternity/ sorority that you have listed.
- Once the acceptance agreement has been turned in to the representative of the College Panhellenic Association, it cannot be altered or changed.
- If you receive an invitation to membership (a bid) from any NPC group that you listed and do not accept it, you will be ineligible to join any other NPC women's fraternity/sorority on the campus until the beginning of the next primary membership recruitment period.
- Read and explain the Unanimous Agreements III. 4. Panhellenic Compact from the NPC Manual of Information 19th Edition
- If you do not receive an invitation to membership (a bid) from any NPC group you have listed, you will be eligible for continuous open bidding if/when space allows. You must understand that not all NPC groups will have available spaces for new members for the academic year.

Panhellenic DICTIONARY

ACTIVE MEMBER A fully initiated undergraduate member of a fraternity or sorority.

BID An invitation to join a fraternity or sorority. In the process those who are invited to join a sorority will receive their bid card on Bid Day, Wednesday, September 25th upon completion of all rounds of recruitment.

CHAPTER The local organization of undergraduate students on a campus recognized by the university and the National or International organization.

INITIATION A formal ceremony during which new members become active members of the chapter.

LEGACY An immediate family member of an initiated member. generally sister or daughter. Some sororities also recognize grandchildren, stepsisters, and stepdaughters. Please see each chapter's individual page in this booklet for more information about legacy policies.

NATIONAL PANHELLENIC CONFERENCE (NPC) The umbrella organization for 26 national

and international social sororities.

NEW MEMBER A person who accepts a bid from a fraternity or sorority chapter

NEW MEMBER EDUCATOR

The individual who is the liaison between the new members and the chapter. This individual is responsible for implementing and monitoring the new member program and preparing the new members for initiation.

NEW MEMBER PERIOD A

period of six to eight weeks prior to initiation when a new member learns about her sorority's values and expectations, and develops relationships within that organization.

PANHELLENIC COUNCIL The

governing body of the 14 NPC sororities at Michigan State University.

PANHELLENIC EXECUTIVE

BOARD The eight members of the Panhellenic Executive Board lead the Michigan State Panhellenic Council. They are sorority members who have disaffiliated during Recruitment to oversee the process.

PARTY This refers to each individual recruitment event ("I have five parties today") or the group of PNMs that visits a sorority during a particular time slot ("The next party is waiting outside").

POTENTIAL NEW MEMBER

(PNM) A prospective new member of a sorority.

PRIMARY RECRUITMENT

Designated period in the Fall when Potential New Members and Panhellenic sororities get to know each other through parties. Primary Recruitment is a mutual selection process, which means that both the potential new members and the individual sororities are making choices. Potential new members will make decisions regarding chapters they want to revisit, and the sororities will make decisions regarding the women they want to invite to their parties.

RECRUITMENT GUIDE An

active sorority woman who has chosen to assist and counsel Potential New Members during the Primary Recruitment process.

Recruitment Guides

Who are they? Recruitment Guides are women who have disaffiliated from their own chapters during the recruitment period to help Potential New Members go through the formal recruitment process. They serve as the liaison between PNMs and chapters during recruitment. Recruitment Guides are trained in how to prepare PNMs for recruitment. They are impartial to the process and are able to advise PNMs on finding effective ways to connect their values with another chapter's.

Responsibilities of Recruitment Guides:

- Complete all logistical duties required which could include assisting PNMs as they travel between recruitment locations, explaining recruitment procedures, assisting with data entry, contacting PNMs who do not arrive on time and so on.
- Provide thorough knowledge of the Panhellenic community and being an advocate for the community.
- Stay in contact with each PNM to provide support and guidance that will contribute to her retention throughout the recruitment process.
- Engage them in discussions of their personal values and how those values will better inform their decision-making.

On the first two Spirit Days, PNMs will attend parties in their neighborhood groups. Recruitment Guides will walk with the PNMs to each party and wait for them outside while the PNMs are inside the party.

Tip of the Day: bring comfortable walking shoes and an umbrella!! Groups will be walking from house to house -- rain or shine!

Description: On Spirit Day PNMs will get the chance to interact with one to two members from each chapter. The conversations are friendly, getting-to-know-you style conversation.

When? Friday, September 13th and Sunday, September 15th

How many parties? PNMs will get the chance to attend parties at all 14 chapters.

How long? Each party is 20 minutes on this day.

What to wear? PNMs will wear the Spirit Day t-shirt that is given to them by the Panhellenic Council. Feel free to pair this shirt with any type of bottoms - jeans, slacks, shorts, skirt, etc. to make the outfit unique to you!

Philanthropy DAY

Philanthropy Day

Saturday, September 21th at 9:00 am - 10:00 pm

On Philanthropy Day PNMs will meet with their Recruitment Guides in the morning and be given their schedule for the day. From there, PNMs will be responsible for getting themselves to parties. There will be a bus system provided with six stops.

Tip of the Day: This is the longest day of recruitment - remember to drink a lot of water, eat enough meals, and take frequent mental breaks to relax and reflect on this process.

Description: On Philanthropy Day PNMs will get the chance to learn about the chapter's philanthropy. A philanthropy is a charity that the chapter raises money and awareness for throughout the year; each chapter's philanthropy is unique to them. PNMs may watch a philanthropy video, or do a craft related to the philanthropy during the party. Conversations on this day go beyond getting-to-know-you questions and may include topics of service, charity, etc.

When? Saturday, September 21st.

How many parties? PNMs will visit anywhere from one to ten chapters.

How long? Each party is 30 minutes on this day.

What to wear? Philanthropy Day is still casual, while to gives you a chance to show off who you are. Outfits on this day typically range from jeans and a blouse, to casual dresses. Still unsure of what to wear? Think of something you would wear out to a nice lunch with your family!

On Values Day PNMs will meet with their Recruitment Guides in the morning and be given their schedule for the day. From there, PNMs will be responsible for getting themselves to parties. There will be a bus system provided with six stops.

Tip of the Day: Wear comfortable shoes because you will be getting tours of each chapter's house.

Description: On Values Day, chapter members will have more intimate conversations with PNMs about their chapter's values. Conversations may include topics about family, friendship, service, etc. PNMs will also receive tours of the chapter houses they are invited back to.

When? Sunday, September 22nd.

How many parties? PNMs will visit anywhere from one to six chapters.

How long? Each party is 40 minutes on this day.

What to wear? Values Day is a little dressier - business casual is the way to go! Take this is an opportunity to show off your own personal style. This can range from dresses, to nice pants and a blouse. The choice is yours!

What are your personal values? Why do you think it is important for women in the same chapter to share similar values? How have you seen your values reflected throughout recruitment thus far?

Preference DAY

Tuesday, September 24th at 5:00 pm - 10:00 pm

On Preference Day PNMs will meet with their Recruitment Guides in the afternoon prior to the first Preference Party beginning.

Tip of the Day: Take time to self-reflect and begin thinking about what chapter you can see yourself being a member of.

Description: PNMs will participate in a preference ceremony in the house and will also be given a dessert.

When? Tuesday, September 24th.

How many parties? PNMs will visit one to two chapters.

How long? Each party is 50 minutes on this day.

What to wear? Preference Day is the most formal day of recruitment. PNMs should wear a formal dress, jumpsuit, romper, or suit paired with heels or flats.

What to wear: Whatever you are comfortable in! Please wear a plain t-shirt to bid day, as all chapters will be giving their new members t-shirts to wear with their new sorority letters on it after opening up their bid card.



Description The final day! Bid Day is the day that Potential New Members receive an invitation to membership, or a "bid card" from a chapter. Potential New Members will arrive to the Bid Day location on this day and meet with their neighborhood groups. Recruitment Guides will pass out Bid cards in envelopes and each woman will open their bid card at the same time and run home to their new chapter! Each chapter will have a celebration event for the New Members immediately after Bid Day at their chapter house.

If you do not receive a bid, you will be called by your Recruitment Guide or a member of the Panhellenic Council the morning of Bid Day.
